## Manchester "Brunswick" Maranatha Group

From the early days of the Maranatha Community we have been holding all-day Saturday gatherings for members of the community in the Manchester area on the **first Saturday of every other month (Feb, April, June etc)** which are often attended by members from further afield. Until mid 2008 these were held at Harpurhey United Church. However we moved in 2008 to Brunswick Parish Church, just south of the city centre, in order to bless and encourage the development of Harpurhey's Children's Club which was also running on Saturday mornings. Brunswick church is a similar style of building (1960's brick construction) which has seats in a horse-shoe-shape around a central floor space, which enables us to seat a good number of people while maintaining our *"in the round - no one is any more important than anyone else"* seating arrangement, which is so important in any Maranatha gathering.

I have been coming to the Manchester gatherings for over 10 years, having been invited by our regular worship leader Paul Barnsley to play in the music group, which was my first contact with Maranatha. Meeting from 10:30am to 4pm gives a relaxed feeling to the day as there is time for people to bring testimonies and words from the Lord to us (having first shared them with the discernment team) in between the times of worship (partly pre-prepared and partly spontaneous) and the invited speakers. This year our theme has been *"Aspects of Love"* and we have heard from several people with various ministries in Manchester and further afield, including City Centre Ministry to Homeless, Street Pastors, and River of Life Church in Uganda.

On 1st October we're not meeting at Brunswick because we're inviting everyone to come together from all over the Community to the National Assembly, which we're holding at Cheadle Hulme Methodist Church as this seats more people. The attendance at our regular Manchester Gatherings has been declining over the years, but we still regularly get over 40 people coming, and we know from recent testimony that the meetings are not only a blessing and empowering time for those who attend, but we are spiritually blessing the area in which we meet, where new things are happening in the churches and surrounding communities.

## PASSION CAKE

On the morning of 7th May, as people entered the church hall for the Leeds vision meeting, they were warmly greeted and guided towards refreshments. There they encountered slices of scrumptious home-made cake, known as passion cake.

Some thought this was a “*must*” for lunchtime. Others, however, could not resist. When lunchtime came, there was none left! Those who did partake clearly experienced a treat. In fact, because of the number of requests received for the recipe, **Colin Chappelow** (Leeds) is kindly passing it onto all Spotlight readers.

Under these circumstances, was it not the duty of the reporter to try it out? Having done so, he can confirm that it is as good as it looked! Moreover, I understand that at their meeting on 23<sup>rd</sup> July, the Community’s Trustees sampled the cake. Does this amount to an official Maranatha endorsement?!

Details of the recipe are set out below ..... enjoy!

### RECIPE

10oz p. flour  
1tsp. Salt  
1tsp. Bi carb  
2tsp. B. powder  
6oz soft brown sugar  
2oz chopped walnuts  
3 eggs  
3 ripe bananas mashed  
6oz grated carrots  
6 fld. Oz. corn oil

### METHOD

Mix dry ingredients, add carrots, bananas, walnuts, eggs and oil and beat for 1 min. Divide between 2 large sandwich tins or 8/10” tray.

Cook at Gas no. 5 – 375F – 190C for 25-35 mins testing if resistant to touch after 20-25 mins, if so cake is ready

### FILLING AND TOPPING

3oz soft butter  
3oz cream cheese  
6oz icing sugar  
½ tsp. vanilla essence.

Beat everything together and, use ½ between cakes and ½ on top decorate with walnuts.
